We were once again very lucky with the weather. For the third year running we ended up with a really glorious day in which to enjoy our scenic Surrey Countryside.

"BL across B2130, over/round stile + BR (100d) on TK." Luckily the field was made up of experienced LDWA members so maps were soon consulted when the "tarmac drive" did not appear, and the route was picked up again.

No more grumbles were heard about the Route Description so I hope that there were not any other bloomers, and I hope I am forgiven! If you have any comments on this or on any other aspect, you may like to complete the enclosed questionaire, to help me make improvements for the 1990 Event.

As most Entrants were so full of praise for the Marshals and the Event as a whole, the 1990 Event will be identical to 1989. Apart from the excellent weather laid on by the Surrey Group, there were 3 items particularly praised: 1. The reduced amount of tarmac. 2. The extensions / alterations over Puttenham Common and in the DEVIL'S PUNCHBOWL. 3. The welcome recieved at each of the Checkpoints (all undercover), especially at the last one at Keeper's Cottage where Linda's family and Glenys were able to give more individual service, as the field had become more strung out.

The relatively good conditions underfoot meant that the last finisher was well inside the time limit of 12 hours. And by using disposable cups, there was very little washing up to be done, so there was plenty of hot water available for the Showers, even for the few Ladies who made sure of their right to be fully refreshed.
