


The Gibbet Trophy

Awarded to the fastest team from the Surrey LDWA group. Its sister trophy, the Leith Trophy, was awarded to the fastest non-Surrey team. A team consisted of at least 3 walkers who had to walk the entire route as a group. The fastest 3 were rewarded with their names on the trophy. In 1978 it was awarded to Chris Steer, John Westcott, & Tony Youngs; in 1980, Robin Paul, Tony Youngs & Chris Steer and in 1982, to the father and son Brian & Steve Alden & John Robinson.





The Summits was a purely walking event - the only one in the LDWA's calendar.

This was done to 'discourage running' and rather than being awarded to the team with the 3 fastest aggregate times it was awarded to the groups with the most finishers. Hence the absence of names for the '85, '86' & '87 events.

It was probably in the late 80's that the awarding of the trophies was discontinued. It's difficult to be any more precise than that since our archives for the Summits is incomplete over that period.

The Gibbet trophy currently resides with the Surrey Group (Tony Cartwright).
