REPORT AND RESULTS

The weather conditions during the week preceding the Winter lanners gave rise to a certain amount of doubt as to whether the event would take place. Even as early as the Wednesday before the event I was getting telephone calls from entrants living in Plymouth and other parts of the West Country to say they would not be taking part. However, the expected blizzard supposedly coming from the West Country which was to bring snow with 10 foot drifts stopped well short of the Surrey area. The weather forecasters told us we were lucky but the truth is that they will just not admit that the LDWA Surrey group has more influence over weather conditions than they have.

Unfortunately the influence did not extend to arranging a sunny day. The gloom during the early part of registration gave way to daylight which revealed an overcast sky which was to be the order of the day throughout the event. Apart from a flurry of snow in the afternoon it stayed dry enough, the forecast sleety rain fortunately staying away until the early hours of the Monday morning following. The snow which had fell a fortnight earlier and the low temperatures had kept intact caused a few problems but I think most people would have preferred this to the muddy conditions which would have prevailed had the Monday thaw come 24 hours earlier. On my walk out of the route a few days before Christmas I sank past by kness in a couple of places the most cotorious of these being in the dip about half way on that long track between Poleden Lacey and Pigden Cottage.

There were 166 who set off from the Lestherhead car park on the 30 mile route proving exercise for the Tanners Marathos in July. To look at it on a map it is a long thin route converging so the outward and homeward leg conceids to use the Shere underpass in both directions with a bubble at the end. Very much like a partly blown up sausage ballomabeing stretched. The reason for using the Shere underpass twice is to avoid having up to 1000 walkers crossing the A25 on a busy Sunday in July.

One or two comments were made about the way the route zigzagged up and down just after Shere on the homeward leg. Bill Grace suggested it was to increase the mileage on what would have otherwise been a short route while another theory was that the additional climbing was introduced to make the route tougher. The roal reason is that having decided to use the Shere underpass and wanting then to take the route along the foot of the downs there is unfortunately no direct path through to Colekitchen Lane and the path used was the best available.

Another feature of the route was the use of a small part of the Downs Link Path. This is the proud joint project of The Waverley Borough Council, the Surrey and West Sussex County Councils to link up the North and South Downs Ways. Much of the 30 mile link is along the disused railway track of what used to be the Guildford to Horsham line

and this makes the walking very boring. It seems though the Surrey County Council consider the railway image an advantage because even this part of the link as the path goes along the slopes of St Marthas Hill is being made to look like a minature disused railway track. :This was probably not so evident to Winter Tanners walkers with the snow covering the prepared surface.

The snow also caused problems with the route description. Identifying grassy and sandy tracks proved difficult. I also think the show was the cause of the biggest critism of the route description when selecting which track to take to leave Blackheath and go through to the Farley Heath Car Park. It seemed obvious to me that the main track was the left hand one when I walked the route out in the Docomber mud rather than the January snow. Another point where walkers seemed to go wrong was at the end of the enclosed fenced path just after Nayon House Farm. 'I think probably the confusion here was that the more obvious stile took you into the field ahead whereas the stile to take was on the right. The route description did tell you to turn right. Bill Stirling decided to retire just after this part of the course and while waiting for his lift home he decided to get back to Leatherhead by going via Victoria. I think Bill is trying to get some sort of record for travelling the furthest distance while taking part in a 30 mile event.

Wilf Taylor completed the course in the fastest time of 4 hours 39 minutes with Rex Stickland and Mark Pickard within 10 minutes of him. There were 147 registered as having completed the event with the last 3 'phoning in to report their arrival at Leatherhead at 12 minutes to 8.

Most Walkers who commented on the route and route description thought they were both good in Spite of the minor critisms. I also had many appreciative comments from the walkers on the excellent way they were looked after by the marshals. I too would like to endorse those comments by adding my thanks to all those who assisted with the event. There are many difficulties in providing hot drinks in freezing temperatures but these difficulties were ably overcome. This is the 3rd year I have had the services of Dave Green and he now knows more about the start and finish registration than I do: I hay be losing his services next year because he has graduated to the 30 milers now having templeted the Gatliffe Marathon as his introduction to this distance. He does wince a little every time you mention it though.

THE MINTER TANNERS .- TEN YEARS ON

It is now difficult to imagine the attitude to cross country walking when the first Winter Tanners was held on 11th January 1976. There were relatively few organized walks of this distance even though the Tanners Marathon held in July had been held 15 times and the idea of walking 30 miles in the middle of winter was very revolutionary. Surely only the toughest of walkers would be able to complete the walk.

However there were a few foolish, hardy souls who had expressed a desire to have a go and so the late Alan Blatchford set about satisfying this demand. It also gave his the opportunity to have a welk out of the route well in advance of the summer event.

It was expected that about 30 would turn up at that first Minter Tanners but there were twice as many who did so. The notes, giving a rough indication of where the route was to go were distributed on a "shares" basis and we set off. Most of us were not confident enough to venture off alone on the basis of the notes so we stayed with the organizer but still managed to get lost about 5 times. It is interesting to note that the report of that walk includes such phrases as "we rushed on", "continued at a good pace", "quickly pressed on" but Alan's time was 9 hours 15 minutes. For the record my own time was 10hours 25minutes.

The Winter Tanners was set up to be an informal walk and the early ones were very much a do-it-yourself registration and route finding affair. It soon gained in popularity to become an event in it's own right. When I took over as organizer in 1981, following Alan's death in September 1980, the numbers taking part had already risen to an extent whereby a proper registration was set up and a more researched route description was provided.

I have been under pressure from some quarters to make more of the event by at least having an undercover venue but I prefer to retain as much of the spirit and tradition as possible by reducing formality to a minimum. It is for this reason I also like to take part myself.
